


Conundrums of Humanity

He has been a guest columnist at the Washington Post, the Los Angeles Times, The Times of London and the New York Times. For 20 years he wrote longer pieces for Encounter and Prospect magazines. In 1972 he won the silver medal at the Venice Film Festival for his documentary, Its Ours Whatever They Say. He has previously published six books. His lengthy interviews with world leaders have been published in leading papers all over the world, often

causing political waves. He was a member of Swedish Prime Minister Olof Palmes international commission on nuclear disarmament and of the original BBC committee that conceived BBC World Television.
