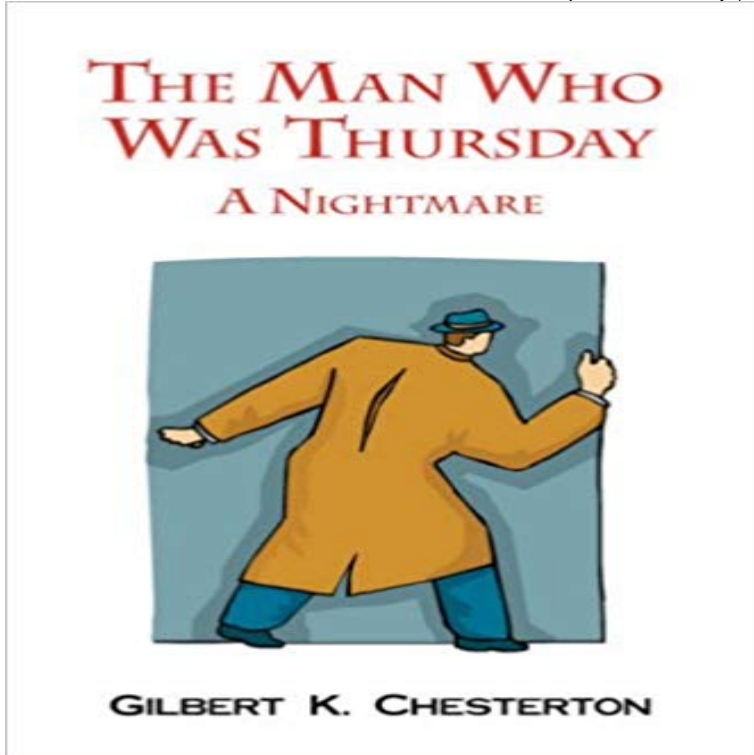


The Man Who Was Thursday - A Nightmare
